RESAP INSPECTION

On August 4th, 2022, Larry Oetken, Job Training Safety Coordinator with Northeast Community College (also associated with Nebraska Rural Electric Association) brought a team of 9 safety inspectors comprised of employees from neighboring coops near and far, to conduct NEA's first official Rural Electric Safety Achievement Program (RESAP) inspection. RESAPs goal is to "Work with representatives from statewide association safety professionals, distribution and G&T cooperatives and Federated Rural Electric Insurance Exchange to create a culture of safety."

The inspection took an entire day with the team scouring the office, shop and trucks checking for safety violations and potential hazards. At the end of the day during the report out and review, the NEA team was told that we did very well for our first inspections. We had three violations that need to be corrected immediately otherwise suggestions were made for improvements where they thought were necessary.

Kudos were given specifically on how well our crew worked together and stressed safety. They were also impressed on the cleanliness and organization of our shops as well as how friendly and knowledgeable our staff were when asked questions by the audit team.

Annual Performance Measures (OSHA data) and a Safety Improvement Plan are completed in the RESAP program each year. Onsite visits are conducted on a rotation due to the number of participating Electric Cooperatives and Public Power Districts.

NEA's safety record speaks for itself as it has been 3 years since our last lost time incident. General Manager Shawna Glendy states "we are very proud of our team and their commitment to safety. Line work is one of the most dangerous jobs out there, our guys take it seriously and do everything they can to make sure everyone goes home safely at the end of the day."

NEA voluntarily entered the RESAP program because of our commitment to our members and employees, along with our belief in elevating our safety culture and work practices.

Don't Become Electricity's PATH TO GROUND

When electric utility equipment becomes damaged, the ground and objects can become energized.

If you are in a situation where there could be downed power lines or a damaged pole, guy wire or padmount transformer (green box), know what to do to save your life and the lives of others:

CAR ACCIDENT



Stay inside your vehicle or cab since the ground or objects could be energized.

Call 9-1-1 and report that there are downed or damaged power lines or a dislodged green box.

Wait for the utility crew to arrive to deenergize the power.

Do not exit until someone from the utility says it is safe to do so.

ONLY EXIT IF THE VEHICLE IS ON FIRE

Cross your arms over your chest and **make a clean jump out.**

Do not touch the vehicle and the ground at the same time.

Make solid hops with your **feet together** as far away as you can.

Do not return to the vehicle.



IF YOU ARE A Bystander

Do not approach the scene to try and help.

Stay at least 50 feet away and do not lean on or touch anything, including fences or guardrails.
